UNDERSTANDING URBAN SYSTEMS AND STAKEHOLDERS

WHAT IS THIS RESEARCH ABOUT?

Recent research and policy work have identified the importance of working within existing systems in urban humanitarian response and with local stakeholders¹. Urban systems which relate to humanitarian response work include urban service provisions, both market and public sector (e.g. water and electricity), as well as governance and decision-making systems. Urban stakeholders may include community-based organisations, police and fire services, municipal governments, water boards, local businesses, and more.

The first step in working with urban systems and stakeholders is to understand them – what already exists? What are their capacities, needs and priorities, and the relationships between them? However, there is little documented and shared guidance on this topic, and a general lack of clarity around these issues. It is unclear to what degree humanitarians effectively understand urban systems and stakeholders, and what this understanding brings to humanitarian response.

OBJECTIVE AND RESEARCH QUESTIONS

This research project seeks to address:

- What do we mean by urban systems and stakeholders?
- Who is trying to understand what about urban systems and stakeholders and how?
- Why is this understanding important?
- **How** effective are existing tools/guidance in providing information about urban systems and stakeholders?
